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Jow Tourist



A Gesture of Familiarity Eve Wood

Jow is an artist preoccupied with perceptible experience, how the eye takes things in and makes them real, or not, and it is this ambiguity, this moment of stasis between words and thoughts, objects and ideas, or symbols floated delicately on a page that gives her work its power. In her newest body of work, she further exemplifies this vision through a series of large-scale acrylic on panel paintings along with two new neon sculptures and a series of discreetly elegant drawings.

Aptly titled *Tourist*, the recent work describes not so much a literal place traveled to or from as it does the cultural nostalgia associated with a particular city. Jow's approach to this is transitional and/or generational and is in no way direct or literal as she incorporates song lyrics. further interpreted, or compressed into Morse code to suggest both the complexity and intimacy associated with iconic cities like New York, Paris, London or San Francisco, (with Canada added because the artist hails from Vancouver) each with its own cultural referents and suggestibility. Tony Bennett's "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," for example describes a longing for that chilly city high on the hill just as Frank Sinatra rhapsodized about the magic and allure of New York. Jow synthesizes this iconic wistfulness into a series of colored panels that appear to condense the sensibility of each

particular city down to its essence. Jow has chosen a limited color palette of red, white and blue, not necessarily because they are specifically American, but also because these colors are found in the flags of France, Japan and Canada as well, further suggesting a cohesion in regard to human experience, how we perceive the world, communicate with one another or establish cultural identity.

Also included in the exhibition are two neon text based sculptures that like the early work of Bruce Nauman attempt to subvert their own inherent "objectness" with wit and wordplay. Thus, the word "Godspeed" which linguistically means a prosperous journey and good health, transforms with Jow's itinerant flickering S, into the words "God Peed," a bawdy comment that could mean anything from God is also susceptible to human weakness to religion, like everything else is simply another tool used in the service of commerce. This linguistic gesture represents another kind of transformation wherein the artist, rather than transposing song lyrics into visual language, i.e. Morse code, breaks down that language, creating new and often socially critical meanings that are also humorous.

Neon lighting became a popular fixture in outdoor advertising in the early 1920s. Visible even in daylight, people would stop and stare at the first

neon signs dubbed "liquid fire." Technology has obviously far surpassed the age of neon and yet it has come to be associated with American commerce and the thriving industry of the early 1920's and 30s as well as the gaudiness of certain American cities like Las Vegas and Los Angeles. The other sign "Wish You Were Beer," also subverts language to create a humorous statement, though this piece also deals with nostalgia and sentimentality as well as referencing travel and the "picture postcard," itself an idyllic and romanticized phenomenon of the late 19th century.

Even the drawings, made on hotel stationary and culled from around the world, suggest their own kind of subversion and delightful ambiguity. Using glitter and the same comical linguistic twists and turns, Jow further contemporizes the idea of travel as a gesture of familiarity, the collecting of stationary from different parts of the world, a way for the artist to mark both time and experience. Whether or not she has actually traveled to those places is irrelevant as it is the impulse to take ownership through mark making, creating a residue of personal experience, real or imagined, that is ultimately the most lasting expressive impulse.

Jow studied fine arts at Capilano College and the Emily Carr Institute of Art + Design in Vancouver before relocating to the United States. She has previously exhibited her irreverent and witty drawings about contemporary life in Vancouver, New York and Los Angeles. Jow's 2011 solo show, *A California Minute* at Marine Contemporary, Los Angeles, CA was reviewed by Leah Ollman in the Los Angeles Times and Susan Michals in the Wall Street Journal. She presently lives and works in Los Angeles, CA.

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





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


